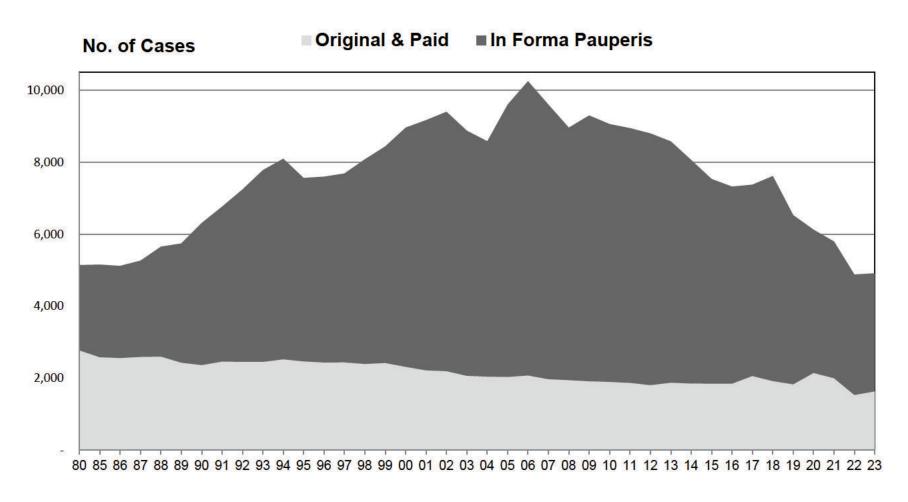

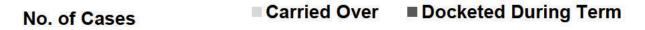

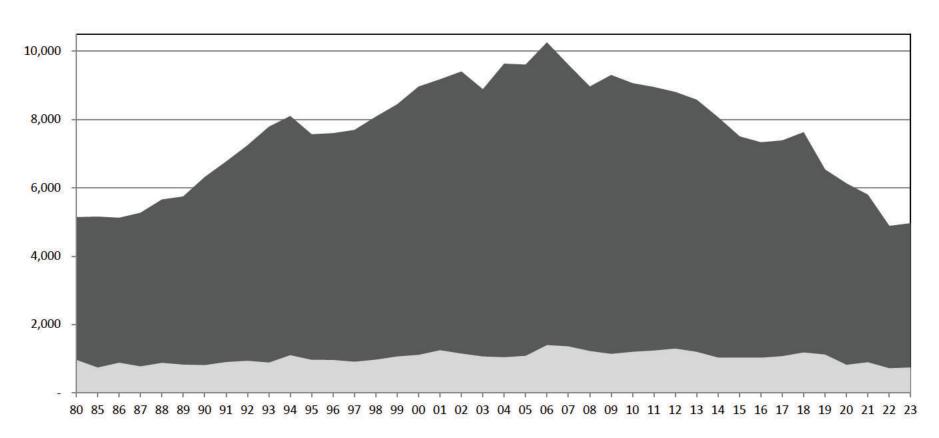

Cases on Docket By Type



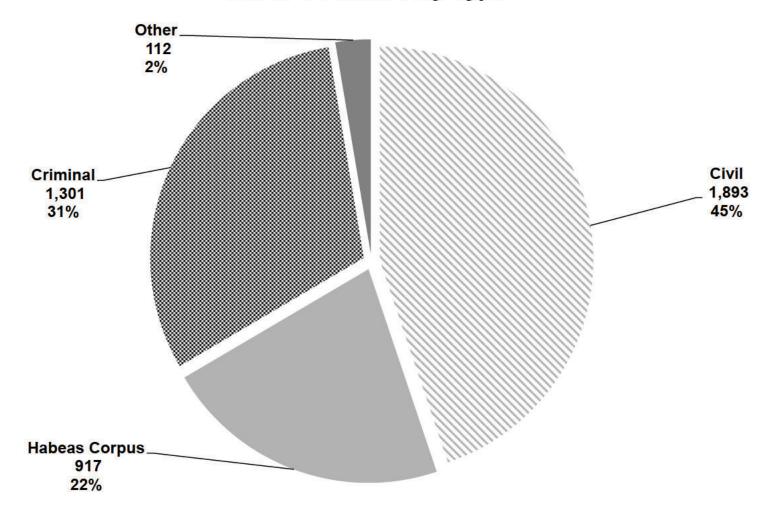
Cases Carried Over & Docketed



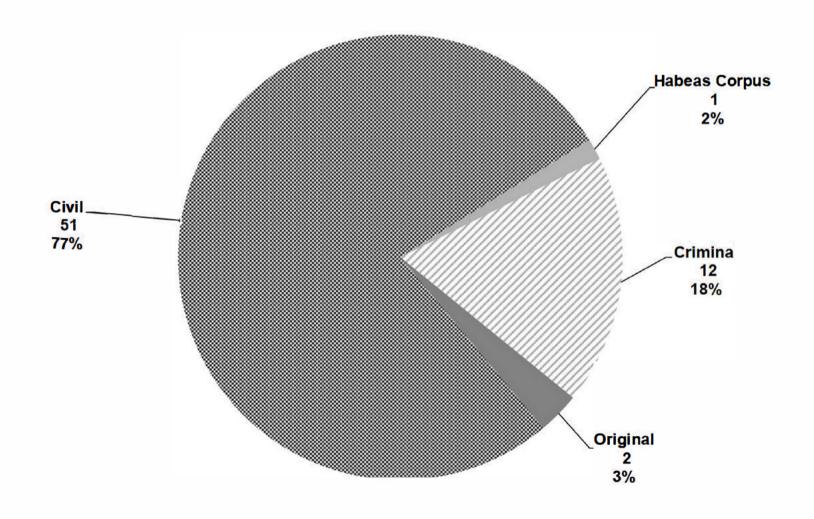


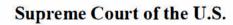

Cases Docketed By Type



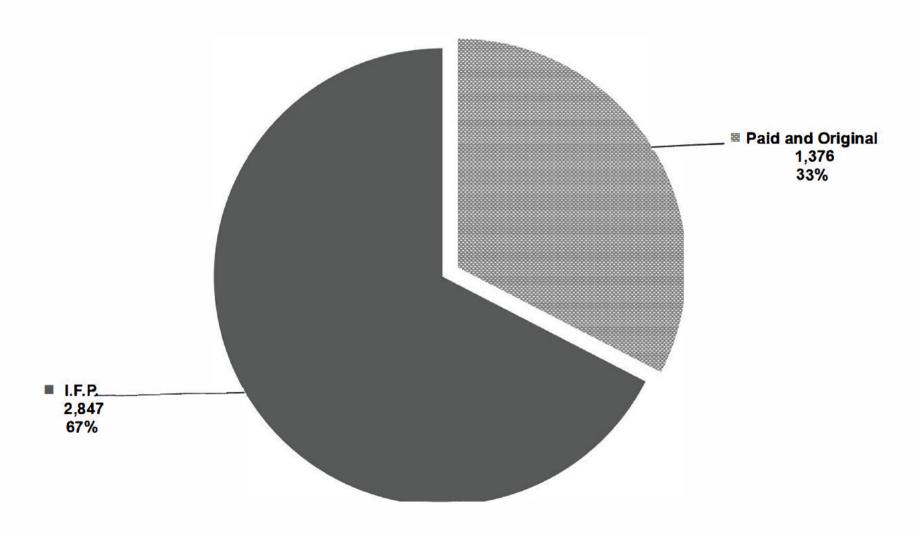
Cases Argued By Type

GENERAL STATEMENT AND INFORMATION

The Supreme Court Salaries and Expenses account funds salaries of the Chief Justice, eight Associate Justices, and the employees of the Supreme Court of the United States (Court). The account also funds the Court's necessary expenses, including printing and binding of the Supreme Court reports, purchasing books, and miscellaneous expenses.

The fiscal year (FY) 2026 request for the Court totals \$166,358,000. The request is the sum of \$3,231,000 of mandatory appropriations and \$163,127,000 of discretionary appropriations. The discretionary request includes \$1,500,000 of no-year funding for planning and implementing periodic Court-wide technology and automation upgrades and a one-time request for \$26,814,000 of no-year funding to protect the Justices and their families at their residences.

FISCAL YEAR 2025 APPROPRIATIONS

Based on enactment of the FY 2025 Full-Year Continuing Appropriations and Extensions Act (P.L. 119-4), the judiciary's starting point for developing its FY 2026 budget request reflects bill language and appropriations levels enacted in the FY 2024 Financial Services and General Government appropriations bill (division B, title III, P.L. 118-47). The FY 2025 enacted discretionary funding level is \$129,323,000. In addition, the FY 2025 Further Continuing Appropriations Act (P.L. 118-158) provided \$13.6 million in supplemental appropriations for residential security for justices that was requested in the conference appeal.

ADJUSTMENTS TO BASE TO MAINTAIN CURRENT SERVICES

A. JUSTICES

1. Annualization of 2025 pay adjustment

Mandatory Increase: \$13,000

The requested increase provides for the annualized costs of the 2025 pay adjustment of 1.7 percent for justices, effective as of January 2025. The requested increase provides for the cost associated with three months of the 2025 pay increase (from October to December 2025) in FY 2026.

2. Benefits increases

a. Health benefits

Mandatory Increase: \$15,000

Based on information from the Office of Personnel Management (OPM), agency health benefit premium contributions are projected to increase by an average of 5.0 percent in January 2025 and 10.1 percent in January 2026. The requested increase annualizes the 2025 premium increase and includes a nine-month provision for the increase anticipated for FY 2026.

b. FICA adjustment

Mandatory Increase: \$5,000

Based on information from the Social Security Administration,

employer contributions to the Old Age, Survivor, and Disability Insurance (OASDI) portion of the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) tax increased in 2025. The salary cap for OASDI increased from \$168,600 to \$176,100 in January 2025. The requested amount is needed to pay the judiciary's contribution in FY 2026.

B. COURT SUPPORT PERSONNEL

3. Annualization of 2025 pay adjustment

Requested Increase: \$572,000

The requested increase provides for the annualized costs of the 2025 pay adjustment of 2.0 percent, effective January 2025. The requested increase provides for the cost associated with three months of the 2025 pay increase (from October to December 2025) in FY 2026.

4. Promotions and within-grade increases

Requested Increase: \$468,000

The requested increase provides for promotions and withingrade increases for personnel. The salary plan for judicial support personnel provides for periodic within-grade increases for staff who receive a performance rating of satisfactory or higher.

5. Benefits increases

a. Health benefits

Requested Increase: \$470,000

Based on information from OPM, health benefit premium contributions are projected to increase by an average of 5.0 percent in January 2025 and 10.1 percent in January 2026. The requested increase annualizes the 2025 premium increase and includes a nine-month provision for the increase anticipated for FY 2026.

b. FICA adjustment

Requested Increase: \$40,000

Based on information from the Social Security Administration, employer contributions to the OASDI portion of the FICA tax will increase in 2025. The salary cap for OASDI increased from \$168,600 to \$176,100 in January 2025. The requested amount is needed to pay the judiciary's contribution in FY 2026.

C. OTHER ADJUSTMENTS

General Inflationary Adjustments

6. Inflationary increases for contracts, services, supplies, and equipment

Requested Increase: \$808,000

Consistent with guidance from the Office of Management and

Budget, the requested increase is required to fund inflationary adjustments of 2.1 percent for operating expenses such as travel, communications, printing, contractual services, supplies and materials, and furniture and equipment.

7. Inflationary adjustment for library books and research databases

Requested Increase: \$110,000

This request represents a 5.0 percent inflationary increase for the cost of library books and a 4.0 percent inflationary increase for the cost of research databases in FY 2026.

PROGRAM INCREASES

8. Supreme Court Police protection for the Justices' residences and families

Requested Increase: \$26,814,000 FTE: 123

Since May 2022, the United States Marshals Service (USMS) has provided 24/7 protection of the Justices' residences. This mission began on an emergency basis and continues now without permanent staffing. Instead, USMS relies on Deputy U.S. Marshals throughout the country serving on Temporary Duty (TDY) assignments to Washington, DC. This comes at great expense to the agency, both in terms of financial cost and impact on its other core missions.

The Supreme Court has primary authority to protect the Justices' residences but lacks the dedicated resources to do so. This funding request would allow the Supreme Court Police to

assume this mission and assign officers to the residences. Through permanent assignment, they would develop more familiarity with procedures for protection of the Justices and their residences, leading to improvements in the security provided. The Supreme Court Police and the USMS agree that this request represents an overall better and permanent solution to protecting the Justices compared with attempting to maintain the current USMS coverage indefinitely. This request represents the estimated full-year annual cost of providing residential security for all residences and assumes initial execution through contract services.

The Court's FY 2025 baseline funding, coupled with the FY 2025 supplemental funding of \$13.6 million, provides sufficient funding to begin this transition in FY 2025 and assumes completion by the end of FY 2026. However, the rate of obligation is dependent upon the speed at which the Court can hire new police and contract security officers. No-year authority is requested so that unobligated FY 2026 funds for this purpose can be used in subsequent fiscal years until fully obligated.

9. Replace and expand building security systems

Requested Increase: \$2,500,000

The building security systems that provide access control and security camera coverage inside and outside of the Court building are reaching the end of their lifecycle. In particular, the network infrastructure supporting several systems is over a decade old and is failing with greater frequency. This funding

would support replacement of these existing systems, and allow the Court to continue expanding interior camera coverage and cabling.

10. Expand protective intelligence

Requested Increase: \$2,020,000 FTE: 10

This request provides funding to add eight intelligence analysts and two threat investigation officers to the Court's Protective Intelligence Unit (PIU). New intelligence analysts will, among other tasks, perform risk assessments that are used in carrying out the Justices' personal and residential protection missions. New threat investigation officers will address case workloads that exceed sustainable levels for the existing staff. This funding would also be used to replace the PIU's decades-old case management and reporting system.
